Thanks to Bill Marshall who started this effort when he was president and has continued to provide valuable assistance in helping to develop a comprehensive map of the lake and immediate area. Navigational Aids to assist boaters are being explored in conjunction with Appalachian Power Company as to kind and placement.

The Association became a member of the Tri-County Lakes Commission a couple of years ago and made every effort to work within that organization for the good of Leesville Lake. However it became obvious that Leesville Lake was not being served as promised and efforts within this organization were not working. As a result your Association Board of Directors voted to request that a separate arrangement be made with the three Counties supporting Leesville Lake. Discussions are underway with the Administrators of Campbell, Bedford and Pittsylvania Counties to explore how the citizens of the Leesville Lake community can best be served.

As you can see your Association is working very hard to insure the Leesville Lake community continues to improve and provide the best opportunity for its members to enjoy life on Leesville Lake. We appreciate your continued support.

Water Quality Report

The summer of 2016 marks the conclusion of the tenth year of the Leesville Lake Association's water quality program (initiated in 2007). The goals of the program are to ensure that our lake remains clean and healthy by monitoring water quality, to raise awareness of water quality issues and the importance of water quality, and to educate residents about factors that influence water quality and cause the lake to deteriorate more rapidly than necessary. Through the years, the committee has remained steadfast in addressing these commitments. In 2010, our efforts were enhanced by partnership with Dr. Thomas Shahady's environmental sciences program at Lynchburg College, which now performs analyses and has expanded our water sampling capabilities. This year Dr. Shahady has produced several newsletters that discuss important components of water quality, how they influence the health of the lake – from a human health perspective (bacteria) and from a lake health perspective (fish, aquatic vegetation and water chemistry). What can we say about the health of our lake? Quite succinctly, the lake's health remains very good, but we need to remain vigilant.

Leesville Lake exhibits unique features. The upper portion of our lake displays many features of rivers, with a natural current flow from Smith Mountain Lake Dam to Leesville Lake Dam. However, because the lake serves as a pump-storage reservoir for hydroelectric generation, water flow is reversed when water is pumped back to Smith Mountain Lake. In addition to flow reversals, the lake exhibits marked fluctuation in water levels. As our fishermen know, this means that fish habitats change rapidly and often. These flows mix the lake's water and appear to promote health of the lake.

Because massive quantities of water enter our lake during hydroelectric operations, water quality is influenced by the quality of water in Smith Mountain Lake. Fortunately, the water quality of our sister lake is excellent, so the influx of water from Smith Mountain Lake is generally beneficial. However, appropriate operation of the dam's generators is necessary to maintain good water quality. In particular, Appalachian Power began monitoring the dissolved oxygen content of water released into Leesville Lake in 2011 and has established protocols for preferentially passing water through generators from depths in Smith Mountain Lake that contain the most oxygen. They continue to monitor and improve their operations so that the life-sustaining oxygen content of water entering Leesville Lake remains viable.

In contrast to the positive effects of water influx from Smith Mountain Lake, water flowing from the Pigg River can present challenges to the health of our lake. This year, our lake faced a historic influx of debris from the Pigg River, with AEP personnel and our Beautification Day volunteers removing massive amounts of debris. More insidious than debris is the influx of bacteria, nutrients and sediment from the Pigg River. While the content of bacteria (*E. coli*) in the vast majority of our lake consistently remained low, the upper portion of the lake was challenged with higher bacterial loads than previously experienced, and on several occasions the *E. coli* content exceeded Virginia state standards from the mouth of the Pigg River to approximately a mile below Toller Ferry Bridge. In conjunction with Lynchburg College, state agencies and other groups, our Committee hopes to monitor and improve conditions in the Pigg River.

Over the years, the health of Leesville Lake has remained very good. Our lake continues to mature in a controlled fashion, without issues in parameters such as nitrogen, phosphorous, pH, dissolved oxygen, and chlorophyll that either reflect problems or can precede problems.

After a decade of water monitoring, we are confident that Leesville Lake remains in very good health. Our Association and its partners encourage all to enjoy the beauty and bounty of our lake.
